The students are being introduced to all the sea and fishing terminology and quirky habits of the seafarers who fished those waters using the old methods, long before the advent of the trawler. This was a time when the steam boat was new technology, and there were plenty of fish in the sea.

The year 8-10s are getting some insight into life in the Southern States of America during the time when slavery was a fundamental feature of the economy. 'Uncle Tom's Cabin' was written 10 years before the American Civil War (1861) and, through its characters, Beecher Stowe reveals the many heartbreaking and complex issues that were a feature of life in America at that time.

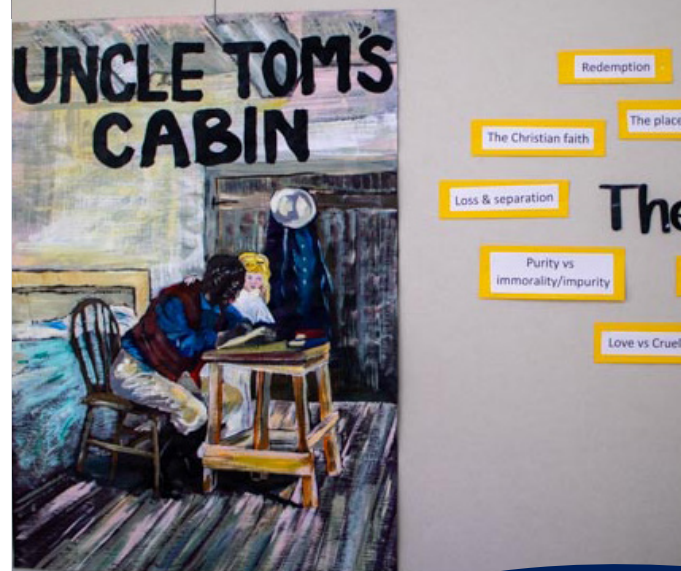
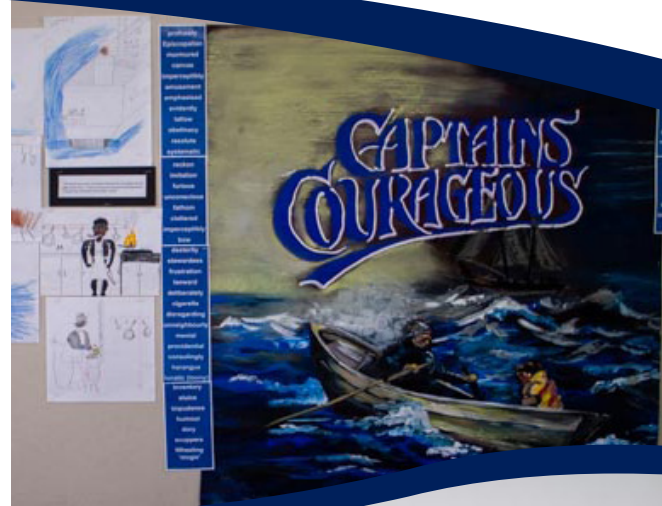

### Snake Catchers Adelaide Incursion

On Friday 19th February, Dean from Snake Catches Adelaide came to talk to the students about snake awareness.

Students were able to get up close and personal with some of the most venomous snakes found in the Adelaide Hills and surrounding areas. Students were amazed to find out that a brown snake is not necessarily brown and that a red bellied black snake could be brown in colour.

We learnt not to judge a snake by its colour and saw how first aid is applied to a snake bite.

We saw first hand that aggressive brown snakes do not attack humans intentionally, but do become aggressive when there is sudden movement nearby.
