From the Principal

It is a remarkable feature of the modern information age in which we live that where information abounds, misinformation does much more abound (apologies to Rom 5:20). This means that a vital skill for modern living is the capacity to identify the difference between information that is trustworthy and information that is suspect as to its accuracy, authenticity and truth. This skill is called discernment.

The Scripture passage for this term, Matthew 7:15-23, brings into focus the importance of discernment. It begins with the warning, "Beware of false prophets". False prophets today are the voices that parade themselves as authentic and true, but aim to deceive. They "come in sheep's clothing", to appear like the truth. In this way falsehood never looks like it is false. Hence the need for discernment to see through this appearance of truth that aims to deceive and lead astray.

Young people who are part of the digital generation today need discernment more than any previous generation of humanity. This is because digital media abounds with information from a myriad of apparently

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convincing sources with apparently compelling truth-claims. These claims can be accompanied by impressive visual images and powerful personal testimonies. This makes the skill of discernment all the more necessary and all the more challenging for young people today.

So, how can young people acquire the skill of discernment?

Perhaps a clue to this undertaking is found in the way that bank staff receive instruction how to identify fake money. I understand that this instruction centres entirely on ensuring staff have a thorough familiarity with the qualities and characteristics of real, authentic money. This makes sense. If the focus was on familiarity with what is fake and false, there would be no end to such familiarity. It is only when the counterfeit money is assessed against what is known to be real money that the counterfeit is exposed. So too, in general life issues, the ability to discern between what is true and what is false, is grounded in knowing what the truth looks like and to compare other truth-claims against this known truth.

For the Christian, the Bible is the guide for what is true and the reference against which all truth-claims are to be tested. Properly understood and applied, the Bible becomes the basis for discernment and the protection against falsehood. The Psalmist declared, "Through your precepts I get understanding (discernment); therefore I hate every false way" (Ps 119:104).

For the Apostle Paul, discernment was the way, "to approve the things that are excellent". With this approval, discernment brings the realization that pursuing the excellent things of God is the way to gain the best life outcomes.

Visitors to the School Administration area on the exam days are asked to keep any noise to a minimum.

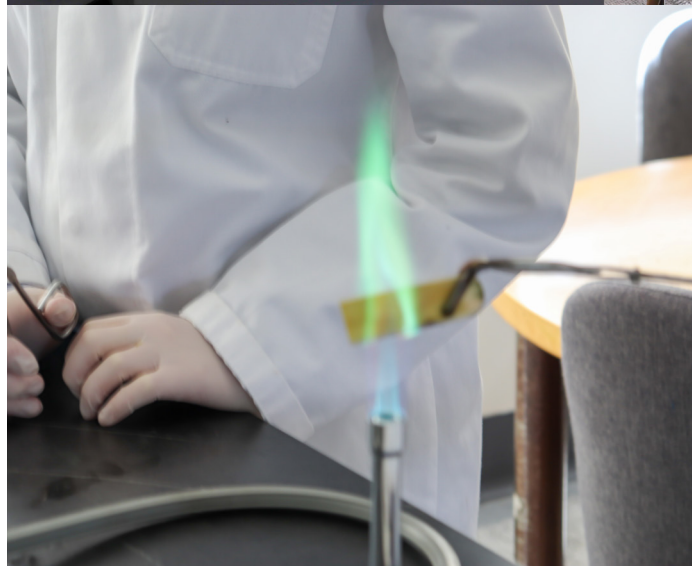
