## Year 5-6 Design \& Tech

Term 1 has been a busy one for the Year 5-6 Tech class. As you will see from the photographs, they have produced excellent pieces of woodwork.
At the commencement, students were introduced to the properties of wood, wood varieties and the technique of laminating. They were also asked to consider the aesthetics in combining timbers to create an effect and a desirable wood product in the form of a board that would have practical uses.
Students were given several pieces of timber of two varieties to prepare for laminating. This involved sanding to a standard where the faces would match when they were glued. Students then glued their pieces together to create a single board. This required them to correctly arrange their pieces and to align them so that they formed a level surface.
Having glued their piece, students then had to face off the board on both sides, decide on their final shape and finish the surfaces using several grades of sandpaper such that the surface felt as smooth as soap. Having finished their board, they sealed the timber using Tung Oil.

The students were all very pleased with their product.

## Year 9-10 Agriculture

During Term 1 the main focus for Technology has been the student gardens.
Students have enjoyed the quick growing radishes that they could eat direct from their patch or take home to use in cooked dishes or salads. Their swedes, turnips, onions, carrots and brassicas are making excellent progress and should be ready for harvest late Autumn through to winter.

Early care in terms of weeding, watering and scarifying to aerate between the rows are skills learnt too. Each student records their garden progress in a log book. Included in the log are soil preparation, growth rates, photosynthesis, culture and planting guides.

As the year progresses, wood box project and coding will begin to claim more study time when the garden slows through the winter months.
We hope to have a little produce left to share with the whole school community as time goes by.
