## From the Principal

As this semester draws to a close, we look back with gratitude on the many blessings throughout the year so far. Special highlights have been the MTCS sports day and cross country as well as several interschool sporting events. It has also been great to reintroduce an agriculture and the cows create careers program this year thanks to the initiative of Mr. Hicks. Finally, the MTCS music dinner was a real blessing to those who attended. The event was planned and run
by Mrs. Sara and Ruth Trinkle and involved the students in practically all aspects from preparation to performing, serving, and cooking, with some of the produce coming from the newly established school agriculture program.
Above all it was encouraging to hear the student body join in proclaiming the great truths of God's faithfulness and salvation in song and I trust that some of the messages in song have remained with you as they have with me.
Elizabeth Cecilia Douglas Clephane was born in Scotland on June 18, 1830 and died there on February 19, 1869, at the age of 39.
In spite of being a frail woman, she was known throughout the community as "Sunbeam," being a helpful and cheery woman. Her father was the County Sheriff and her mother a descendant of the famous Douglas family. She had two sisters, but even though delicate and shy, she served the needs of the poor and sick in the community up to her physical limits. With her sisters, she gave all they did not require for their own daily needs to charity.
She wrote 8 poems in all that were published, and her second one has become famous, "The Ninety

and Nine" taken by Ira Sankey and put to music. Here is a sampling of her poems:
"Beneath the Cross" was written in 1868 and published in 1872. Elizabeth Clephane wrote the poem a year before she died at the age of 39 .
The poem was published a couple years after her death.

Beneath the cross of Jesus I fain would take my stand, the shadow of a mighty rock within a weary land; a home within the wilderness, a rest upon the way from the burning of the noon day heat and the burden of the day.

Upon that cross of Jesus mine eye at times can see the very dying form of One who suffered there for me; and from my smitten heart with tears two wonders I confess the wonders of His glorious love and my own worthlessness.
3. I take, O cross, thy shadow for my abiding place
I ask no other sunshine than the sunshine of His face; content to let the world go by, to know no gain nor loss, my sinful self my only shame, my glory all the cross.

## Cows Create Careers Finale

The Cows Create Careers Programme was celebrated with an online activities session hosted by the programme's organisers and sponsored by the dairy industry. Gathering in the hall, the students were on zoom with the organisers and a number of other schools.

The programme included a facts segment reflecting the importance of dairy to Australia, local communities and the Australian economy. There were also a number of games and competitions in which students could participate. The students enjoyed the activities being able to share knowledge and fun with other schools on line.

The major activity that our students had to engage in was the production of a'moovie' to demonstrate a key aspect of the dairy industry and milk production. Our students were divided into 3 groups for this task. The group chosen to represent the school included Florence, Indy, Tabitha and Azayla. Their video featured the correct method of feeding calves. The group was acknowledged on line and were awarded special certificates and a ribbon to acknowledge their efforts. The session conclude with lunch sponsored by the dairy industry.

This activity formed the basis of an integrated curriculum taking in English, Maths, Technology and Business and economics.
