In preparation for the Bridge Building Challenge this year, the 7/8 students have been looking at the design of bridges in great detail. They were introduced to famous bridges across the world, the 5 main types of bridges and discussed at length the merit and use of each design.

Having done that, students then went on to a web site where they could construct and test bridge designs in a bid to come up with the strongest structure possible. This exercise also taught them to understand the concepts of tension and compression on each strut used in any bridge design.

As is evident in the photographs, students, having designed their bridge electronically, are now using balsa wood and hot glue to construct their bridges. These will be tested for endurance on the school's bridge tester. We look forward to test day and then progressing to the competition!

#### Miss' Science


